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| <p>[2] The Cold War 1945–c.1989</p> <p>The changing international order after 1945 & its consequences</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Emerging super-power rivalry 1945–1949; ➤ Actions of the USSR in Eastern Europe 1945–1948 & response of USA & its allies. ➤ Cold War confrontations: Berlin Wall 1961 & the Cuban Missile Crisis 1962; ➤ Cold War conflicts: Vietnam War, the Soviet war in Afghanistan. | <p style="text-align: center;">NON-BRITISH DEPTH STUDY THE USA 1919–1948: THE PEOPLE & THE STATE (J410/06)</p> <p>[1] The ‘Roaring Twenties’</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ The US economy in the ‘Roaring Twenties’, including Republican party policies and ideology; areas of industry & social groups that did, & did not, experience prosperity; ➤ Restrictions on immigration throughout the 1920s; ➤ Prejudice & discrimination in US society, including the Jim Crow Laws & the Ku Klux Klan; the Red Scare, including the Palmer Raids & Sacco and Vanzetti; ➤ Attempts to combat prejudice, including the NAACP & the UNIA. ➤ Prohibition -causes, aims, implementation & failure; ➤ The US government & women in the 1920s, including women’s rights movements & the Sheppard-Towner Act; | <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Women & the war effort; ➤ Japanese internment; ➤ The war as the foundation for the Civil Rights movement; ➤ The Detroit Race Riots 1943; ➤ Segregation within the military; ➤ Executive Order 8802; ➤ Desegregation of US troops in 1948. |
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
