

Bishop Milner Catholic College Year 11 CURRICULUM PLAN for RELIGIOUS EDUCATION



The curriculum for this stage of students' education has been designed to build on their previous knowledge and understanding of Jewish beliefs and teachings by examining how they are lived out in practise by divergent Jewish communities through festivals, rites and rituals. This will engage them with questions about the impact of Ancient beliefs in 21st century Britain. The sources of wisdom and authority and Hebrew terminology gained in Year 10 will be used to show a breadth and depth of knowledge and understanding. Then will then deepen their knowledge of Catholic Christian beliefs and teachings, practices, sources and forms of expression to understand how Catholic teaching impacts worship and daily life in modern Britain.
