Chaplaincy

During the season of Lent, students have had opportunities and moments for reflection, prayer and faith in action. We have been focussing on the three pillars of Lent of prayer, fasting and almsgiving as a way of living out our faith within school life.

On 16 March, the Kenelm Youth Trust came into school to work with Year 10's for a moment of encounter and faith exploring topics with the theme of being "Called for Greatness" based from the inspiring quote from Pope Benedict XVI. They had a day of activities with moments of reflective prayer and discussion with the Kenelm Youth Trust Team. Well done to all the year 10's. You did the school really proud.

Students have been reflecting on the meaning of Lent, how they can live it out personally and taking time for prayer. Sessions have been taking place in Religious Education Lessons and students have been able to bring this back to their form groups and adapt their prayer tables with their creations. The Chaplaincy Team have been working really hard this term with planning the end of term liturgies and making sure each form had Lenten Prayer Resources so they can pray each day and delve into the meaning of Lent.

Schools within the Multi- Academy have been putting together Student Led Liturgy Videos reflecting on the Stations of the Cross each week. This has formed our moments of prayer in form groups. Students have been led in prayer from students from all eight schools in the MAC and it has been a lovely moment of reflection coming together for this time of worship and walking with Jesus through the Stations of the Cross. Well done to the students who led our Station of the Cross liturgies on behalf of our school community.

We have had fundraising all around our school community for our Lenten Charities. Students and staff have come together for great causes and been so generous truly showing the pillar of Almsgiving during this Lenten Season. We have also been privileged to have Fr Paul come into college to deliver the Sacrament of Reconciliation. A number of students had their confessions listened to in the chapel and it was a very moving and prayerful moment

Preparations for the upcoming Lourdes Pilgrimage are well under way. Our sixth formers and staff are excited for this journey of faith and encounter. We have been fundraising and meeting regularly to work towards this pilgrimage and our input as a school into diocesan plans. If you have any particular intentions that you wish for us to take with us to Lourdes, we will have a box in the chapel next term so keep your eyes peeled. This is a great way to offer up prayers and intercessions to Mary in the place St Bernadette had the apparitions.






NUMBER DAY

Tess Durbeyfield is an ordinary peasant-girl in Victorian Wessex. But when her father discovers that their ancestors were once knightly Norman lords who ruled over the lands they now toiled upon, Tess' life takes a turn for the worse.

When the family horse is killed due to Tess' own mistakes, she is sent to meet the Stoke D'Ubervilles, new adopters of the surname, and quite rich. But in Alec D'Uberville, she faces a monster who will blight her life to come. Fun for all the family!

Tess of the D'Ubervilles - Thomas Hardy

This is an excellently written book. The language is incredibly vivid and conjures a clear image of Victorian farm life. "As part of our visit to Wolverhampton School of Art, Tom Hicks, an amazing photographer was kind

enough to give us a talk about his work. He taught us that art doesn't have to be complex and hard to understand, sometimes simple ideas can be just as effective. He explained how he sometimes collaborates with other people, including local poet, Liz Berry and a sculptor in Copenhagen. We then took a walk around Wolverhampton and he taught us how to crop our images in order to improve the compositions of our photographs.


