

Bishop Milner Catholic College Year 13 CURRICULUM PLAN for A Level RELIGIOUS EDUCATION- Ethics



The curriculum for this stage of students' education is in line with the OCR Philosophy and Ethics specification. The curriculum builds on their existing ethical knowledge to complete these elements of the course, the students will interleave their knowledge gained from both Philosophy and Developments into their Ethics studies. This curriculum will enable students to refine the skills they have previously acquired through means of assessment and the encouragement to always explore the strength and validity of the arguments studied. They will be able to make parallels and synoptic links between their Philosophy, Ethics studies and Developments units to demonstrate appropriate understanding and application of knowledge. Ethics in religion allows students to deepen their understanding of what it means to be human and investigate how we make moral decisions in our everyday life. It allows students to apply their knowledge to debates in the public sphere, such as those surrounding euthanasia and business ethics.
